

KAHNAWA:KE PIGS AT LARGE LAW

K.R.L. c. P-3

[Enacted by 10, Ohiari:ha/June, 1885]

"Preamble"

WHEREAS this is a Law Concerning Pigs Running at Large on the Reserve, The Establishment of Pounds, and the Appointment of Poundkeepers; and, Passed by the Indians in Council of June 10, 1885, and approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council on July 8, 1885, under the provisions of the Indian Act 1880, subsection 2 and 8 of section 74.

SECTION I

"Application"

1. APPLICATION

- 1.1 That from and after this date, all pigs found at large on and off the streets, lanes alleys, or commons of the village, will, under authority granted by section seventy-four (74), subsection eight (8) of the Indian Act, be impounded, and the owners thereof subject to make good all damages done by said pigs.

SECTION II

"Authority"

2. AUTHORITY

- 2.1 Any person may impound pigs found at large within the reserve and the commons under this by-law.

"Poundkeeper"

3. POUNDKEEPER

- 3.1 For the purpose of the foregoing and under the authority of subsection eight (8) of section seventy-four (74) of the Indian Act, a public pound is hereby established and a poundkeeper is appointed.

SECTION III

"Penalties"

4. PENALTIES

- 4.1 For the effectual working of these by-laws and by powers granted under section seventy-four (74), subsection eleven (11) of the Indian Act, fines and fees shall be levied as follows: -

- 4.2 For the first offence, each pig fifty cents (\$0.50), all subsequent offences one dollar.
- 4.3 The fines to be disposed of as follows: - Twenty-five cents (\$0.25) to the poundkeeper, twenty-five cents (\$0.25) to the person impounding said animal, and when the finds collected exceed the above expenses, the surplus shall be placed to the credit of the tribe in the usual way.
- 4.4 If no person appears to claim the said pigs so impounded within five days after the same may have been impounded or if the person claiming the same refuse or neglect to pay the fines and necessary expenses incurred thereon, it shall be the duty of the poundkeeper to give three days' notice to the owner and sell the same to the highest bidder by public auction and having deducted all expenses hand over the surplus, if any, to the owner of the animal thus disposed of and take his receipt for the same.
