<p><b>1. <u>Administrative – Review &amp; Decision</u></b>  <b>Record of Conclusion 06/06/2019 – ALL</b>  The ROC was approved by Joe Delaronde and seconded by Keisha Goodleaf.</p>	
<p><b>2. <u>Urgent Process Presentation – Review &amp; Decision – Vernon Goodleaf</u></b>  It was noted that the “Urgent Process” would only be used in rare instances.  The following six (6) points were reviewed with decisions:</p> <p><b>1) <u>Categorization as Urgent Decisions:</u></b>  -Only after the Law has been submitted to the Regular Process will it then be categorized Type I or II Law.  -Categorization criteria will remain, “ <i>The necessity for immediate legislative action due to issues which pose (or will soon pose) an internal or external imminent objective threat to the security and safety (environmental, fiscal, legal, social, cultural or political) of Kahnawà:ke Territory and the collective rights to its Peoples.</i>”  -It was agreed that once categorization has been confirmed by Council, the Law has officially entered the Process and will be noted in the CDMP Policy &amp; Procedure Manual.  -MCK Council of Chiefs would confirm categorization, give the mandate, and determine the scope and purpose.  -It was also agreed that prior to Confirmation of the Categorization, that KLCC would meet with Legal and Portfolio Chief to discuss urgency of proposed Law or proposed amendments to existing Law.</p> <p><b>2) <u>Timeline Decision:</u></b>  -It was agreed on a 6-month timeline with a possible requested 6-month extension, if required. If the Law is not drafted and enacted within that timeline, then it would automatically go back in the Regular Process.</p> <p><b>3) <u>Front-End Work and Community Consultation Decision:</u></b>  -Because this Process is TEMPORARY would rarely be used, it was agreed:  -The Front-End Work would be at the discretion of the TDC who may choose to forego. The TDC may also choose to only minimally engage the community on specific questions throughout the process.  -A Community Consultation would come later, but the TDC could <i>request</i> to forego.</p> <p><b>4) <u>Final Posting before Enactment</u></b>  -It was agreed that the law will be posted no less than seven (7) days prior to Enactment.</p> <p><b>5) <u>Urgent Process for Amendments Decision:</u></b>  -It was agreed there should be an Urgent Process for Amendments to existing Laws.</p> <p><b>6) <u>Confirmation of the Will of the People Decision:</u></b>  -It was agreed to remove the ‘Confirmation of the Will of the People’ from the Urgent Process. The Confirmation of the Will of the People would apply once the Law goes through the Regular Process.</p>	

**Other Discussion Points:**

**Remove the ‘Confirmation of the Will of the People’ form from the Type II Process.**

***ACTION:** No decision was made, instead it was agreed that Jean would confirm with Suzanne Jackson any concerns with the ‘Confirmation of the Will of the People’ form for Type II Laws.*

**3. Laws Update – Review & Decision**

**Kahnawà:ke Occupational Safety & Health Law – Jean Pommerville**

As follow-up from last month’s meeting, Jean met with the Mike O’Brien and Joel Jacobs, Kahnawà:ke Labor Office, to discuss their submission for a Kahnawà:ke Occupational Safety & Health Law. There is a possibility to separate this law into at least three (3) separate laws because it’s replacing CSST with MSI, and affects the Building Act, R20 and Quebec’s Health & Safety Law.

***SUGGESTION:** Jean Pommerville to meet with the Portfolio Chief Michael Delisle and Mike O’Brien to explain the possibility of having their initial request separated into at least three (3) different laws.*

**Regulations for Kahnawà:ke Residency Law -Leslie/All**

KLCC is scheduled for approval (Request for Decision (RFD)) at a duly convened Council Meeting on July 9, 2019 for the Regulations Application form that was received from the Kahnawà:ke Residency Law Technical Drafting Committee to draft Regulations.

**4. Other**

**McGill Law – MCK Clinic Partnership – Leslie Skye**

The KLCC received a partnership offer from McGill University Law Faculty to have 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> year law students support us through their Legal Clinic program. If we consider their offer, the students would have to be overseen by a lawyer from MCK Legal Services. We would also have to identify specific legal research the student(s) would be responsible for carrying out, with two starting date options scheduled for the Fall 2019 or Winter 2020.

**Kahnawà:ke Family Homes Law Resubmission – Winona Polson Lahache**

Winona informed that Chief Clinton Phillips would be following-up with KLCC to move this Law through the CDMP. The Kahnawà:ke Family Homes Law was repealed on January 22, 2018 and immediately resubmitted via MCR.
